In 2022, Aimed Alliance continued to advocate for upholding, enforcing, and expanding health care consumer protections, including those under the Affordable Care Act, and promoting professional discretion in treatment planning. Throughout the year, Aimed Alliance engaged in original research and analysis on our policy priorities, such as expanding access to treatments; upholding disability rights, anti-



discrimination laws, and consumer protections; ensuring the reliability of health insurance coverage; and developing reasonable and transparent drug pricing.

We created sound, patient-centered policy recommendations that we disseminated through reports, fact sheets, brochures, legislative maps, letters, and comments. ADVOCACY

Aimed Alliance worked on the following issues during 2022:



Encouraged federal executive and judicial action to address non-essential health benefit and alternative funding programs

ADVOCACY HIGHLIGHTS

Aimed Alliance supports laws, regulations, and policies that encourage or require public and private payers to offer quality access to individualized, culturally appropriate, efficient, and transparent health care. Aimed Alliance also supports curtailing the use of discriminatory practices in the delivery of health care and the administration of health insurance and employee benefits. To accomplish these goals, Aimed Alliance educates patients, providers, employers, policymakers, and other stakeholders.



Legislative Successes

Expanding Access to Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD)

The Issue:

For years, federal regulations only permitted health care providers to administer injectable buprenorphine for patients with opioid use disorder (OUD) within 14 days of the medication being delivered to the health care provider. Fourteen days was insufficient time to coordinate schedules and actions of patients, prescribers, pharmacies, and insurers. Additionally, if the medication was delivered and not used within 14 days, the prescriber was required to dispose of it, resulting in unnecessary medical waste.

Our Work:

Continuing our efforts from 2021, Aimed Alliance advocated for the 14-day rule to be expanded. In June 2022, the House passed Section 264 of House Bill 7666, which expanded the 14-day limit to 60 days. However, the Senate had not taken action. To ensure Senate passage before the end of the 117th Congress, Aimed Alliance hosted a legislative briefing on S. 3257; sent a letter of support for the legislation to the Senate signed by 20 organizations; worked with advocates to send state-specific letters to committee leaders; and drafted and published features of bill supporters Aimed Alliance and Young People in Recovery, a fact sheet for advocates, a fact sheet for Senate staff, and an op-ed in Pain News Network: "There Is Another Drug Reform the Senate Must Pass".

Outcome:

Sec. 1264 of Congress's final omnibus bill of 2022 increases the number of days a provider has to administer injectable buprenorphine from 14 days to 45 after receipt. This change will help ensure individuals with OUD have adequate time to organize logistics such as transportation, childcare, and insurance coverage to access their treatment.

Increasing Patient Protections for New York Patients

The Issue:

Step-therapy policies, also known as "fail first," are used by insurers and pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) to require consumers to try and fail on alternative treatments, before the insurer or PBM will cover the originally prescribed treatment. As a result, treatments that may be most effective at treating a condition may be inaccessible to consumers until alternative treatments are proven ineffective. Without proper guardrails, step-therapy policies may also require patients to try and fail on off-label treatments, multiple different treatments, and treatments consumers have previously failed on under a different health plan. Policies can also require consumers to try and fail on a treatment for more than 30 days, forcing consumers to continue to experience symptoms without relief. In 2016, New York passed a step-therapy law, but it had limited protections for consumers.

Our Work:

Over the past several years, Aimed Alliance has led the New York Step-Therapy Alliance, which works with a group of nonprofits, patient advocacy organizations, professional associations, regulators, and legislative officials to determine how the current New York step-therapy law could be improved to better protect patients' access to their necessary medications, and to ensure that bad actors that violate the step-therapy law are held accountable. In 2022, the NY Step-Therapy Alliance hosted a roundtable meeting with legislators to discuss the need for reform and sent letters of support to the Assembly and the Senate supporting the introduced legislation.

Outcome:

In 2022, New York Senator Neil Breslin and Assemblyman John McDonald introduced the following four bills to fix the gaps in the New York step-therapy Law: (1) Protected Classes; (2) Reporting Requirements; (3) Transparency; and (4) Additional Rules and Protections. Our fact sheet on the legislation is available here. During the 2022 session, the Additional Rules and Protections bill passed the Senate, but ultimately was not passed by the Assembly. Therefore, Aimed Alliance will continue to build upon the 2022 legislative success in 2023.

Advocacy, Comments, & Letters

Aimed Alliance met twice with the federal Center for Consumer Information and Insurance Oversight and the departments of Labor and Treasury regarding non-EHB scheme.

We also participated in the All Copays Count Coalition's Capitol Hill Day.

In addition to the state advocacy activities listed above, Aimed Alliance signed on to letters supporting health care consumer protections in Colorado, Delaware, Massachusetts, and Missouri.

Litigation





Depression

In partnership with the Alliance for Mental Health Care Access, Aimed Alliance developed a resource to help patients with depression navigate health plan appeals processes.




Cardiovascular Health

In response to CVS Caremark's announcement that it was limiting coverage of certain anticoagulant medications as of January 1, 2022, Aimed Alliance developed a Know Your Rights brochure to help patients with cardiovascular disease challenge health benefit denials for their cardiovascular treatments.

Health Equity in IBD

As part of Aimed Alliance's Health Equity in IBD project, Aimed Alliance developed three resources for patients with inflammatory bowel disease (IBD). These new resources include: (1) a brochure on the Americans with Disabilities Act and how some individuals with IBD may qualify for these protections; (2) a brochure on the Family Medical Leave Act, which permits eligible employees to take protected time off for certain medical conditions; and (3) a brochure on how to appeal a health benefit denial. 




